B4.3 Distribution Theory

General Prerequisites: Part A *Integration* is essential. A good working knowledge of the Part A *Metric Spaces and Complex Analysis* is expected. Part A *Integral Transforms* and *Multidimensional Analysis and Geometry* are desirable but not essential.

Course Overview: Distribution theory can be thought of as the completion of differential calculus, just as Lebesgue integration theory can be thought of as the completion of integral calculus. It was created by Laurent Schwartz in the 20th century, not long after Lebesgue's integration theory. Besides being an important part of Analysis it also has many applications. One of the main areas of applications is to the theory of partial differential equations, and a brief treatment, mainly through examples, is included in this course. A more systematic study is deferred to the Part C/OMMS courses Functional Analytic Methods for PDEs, Fixed Point Methods for Nonlinear PDEs and Optimal Transport and PDEs. The course also provides preparation for many other Part C/OMMS courses, including Analytic Number Theory, Further Functional Analysis, Complex Analysis: Conformal Maps and Geometry, Topics in Fluid Mechanics, Applied Complex Variables, Stochastic Analysis and PDEs.
